Practise <a href="#">Common exception words</a>.</p> <p>Read/listen to the story of Esio Trot by Roald Dahl up to and including P49. There is a copy of the story for you to look at if you do not have the book at home. Identify any vocabulary that you are unsure about. Look in a dictionary to find the meaning.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What had Mr. Hoppy's job been before he retired? Why is this useful for Mr. Hoppy?</li> <li>• How does Mrs. Silver's day help Mr. Hoppy with his plan?</li> <li>• Roald Dahl says "It was going to be a tense moment." On page 39. What does he mean and why do you think will the moment be tense?</li> </ul> <p>Find out about Palindromes... words that can be read the same way in either direction (e.g. dad, level, noon). Can you think of anymore?</p> <p>Write your own rhyme that might make Alfie grow (using forwards or backwards words).</p> <p>Mr. Hoppy does all of this to impress Mrs Silver. Write a different short story about a 'great feat' that Mr. Hoppy might perform to make him a hero in Mrs. Silver's eyes.</p> <p>SRP: Pick a book on SRP to read and discuss what your child enjoyed about the book. Don't forget to take the quiz!</p>	<p>This week we will be learning about rivers, including what they are and how they are formed. Use the link to watch the videos. <a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/zc3gp4j">https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/zc3gp4j</a></p> <p>Test your knowledge of rivers by doing the quiz.</p> <p>You may want to take a walk by our local river. What do you think you might see? Which creatures would use this as their habitat?</p> <p>Can you design a poster or a factsheet to explain the difference between a river and a lake or to encourage people to look after the river and keep it free from rubbish?</p> <p>You could research important rivers around the world. In which country or continent would you find them? Which animals, birds and insects would live alongside the river in those countries?</p>	<p>This week is all about musical activities.</p> <p>Create homemade instruments with household items. You could create shakes by using pasta or rice in empty bottles.</p> <p>Make your own simple guitar using a tissue box, or a shoebox without a lid or a fruit punnet as a base. Use 4 to 6 rubber bands and wrap them the long way around your box. Experiment with ways of making sounds. How can you change the pitch or volume?</p> <p>Think about everyday sounds, what does a journey to the park sound like? Are there any surprise sounds? Draw a journey on a piece of paper and play the sounds using body percussion and your voice.</p> <p>Listen to different types of music and draw the sounds by moving your hands with pens, paints, colouring crayons or chalk. Which piece of music is your favourite? Why do you like it the most?</p>
